After an action packed 9 days in LA, the VW gang of six headed for Germany – home of VW – yeah! to take part in some of the VW activities that were to be held there in late June. The two big events on the calendar were the Hessisch Oldendorf vintage VW meet, which is held once every 4 years, and the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebrations of the founding of the town of Wolfsburg ( and the VW factory!) which is only held once in 75 years!! Prior to those events though there was some time to kill so that was spent by visiting the factories and museums of other lesser known makes such as Porsche, Mercedes, BMW, Audi ... even DAF ( who?), as well as some technical museums that covered all forms of transport from a real live Concorde aeroplane ( you can walk thru it!), a Russian Space Shuttle, a German U-boat, and for us VW enthusiasts a few VW Kuebels and Schwimmwagens! Anyway, onto the real things!



Hessisch Oldendorf is a small village in north west Germany and every forth year the village turns itself upside down and puts on a vintage VW weekend like no other! One of its citizens is a real keen VW enthusiast and has a private collection/museum like no other. He mobilizes the whole village to take part and all the shops in the village display some VW related piece in their shop window, be it a poster, or some models or even some parts... a nice touch! The campground opens the Wednesday before and the punters start arriving shortly thereafter. By Friday evening the centre of the village is already buzzing with people and is closed to all traffic other than the VW cars that are to be displayed in the show ... basically VW cars made before 1958 and VW Kombis up to 1967, plus any Karmann Ghia. In addition there are also dealer stands, beer and food stands and a large swapmeet area

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Come Saturday morning and things are soon underway. There are about 750 display vehicles parked in the village square and up and down all the cobbled side roads off it, with the ancient half timbered houses providing a nice backdrop. The weather is perfect and the crowds are rolling in, the beer starts flowing pretty quickly and the ocompan band soon puts everybody in a good mood! There is so much to see, where do you start?! The VW factory put on a display of some very nicely restored beetles and Kombis... the VW Commercial division have an off-shoot called "oldtimers" which is dedicated to the restoration of VW Kombis, not just for the factory but also for private customers, and some of their handiwork was on display here. Wander up one street and see some nice Kombis, round the corner and there is a street full of ovals, and round the next corner a street full of Hebmuellers and Karmann convertibles, another street and it's full of Kuebels and schwimmwagens etc etc. One thing soon becomes apparent... nothing is rare ... Barn door Kombis everywhere, Hebmueller convertibles in all colours, Split beetles? Yeah, even ones made in the 40's! OK, some things were still rare....the 4 door Beetle taxi, the 4 door Beetle Police car, the prewar Beetle prototypes and the T34 KG convertible being good examples! Not to forget the pristine Porsche 924 sportscar that the owner had re-powered with a type 1 beetle motor in the boot and a beetle fuel tank in the front where it should be !!



Time to sit down with the other Kiwis and have a beer! ... then it's off to the swapmeet area to see what bargains can be had! Well, bargains might be stretching it but there is certainly everything there that you could ever want for your air-cooled VW ... at a price! There are NOS parts and accessories for your '47 or your '67, original brochures, books, luggage sets etc... it's all there.

I bought myself a couple of things...a genuine VW radio and NOS wing mirrors for my Westy.

Good news for those that own Bay window westy's with the plaid upholstery... that material is available again!

Just after lunch all the show cars go on a drive thru the lovely Weser countryside and end up in another small village further down-river. That village has a small barge-like car ferry that transports the cars across the river, much to the amusement of the thousands of locals that have gathered on the riverside to watch. Of course no gathering would be complete without a beer tent and sausage stall... but there is also lovely German apple cake and coffee to be had..yum yum! However, what everybody is waiting for is the arrival of the schwimmwagens that entered the water at Hessisch and have motored (or schwum!!) down the river and sure enough, here they come around the bend, just like a small armada, and they make a right turn and motor up the ferry landing ramp to much clapping and cheering from the crowd. For a small fee (donation to charity) the owners offer to take passengers for a short "schwimm" and I can say it was quite an interesting ride... not much freeway and a bit of a struggle against the fast flowing current but quite exciting .. and your feet stay relatively dry!

That night there was a dinner in the Town Hall for all those that had registered. Two of our team had registered and enjoyed the festivities, the rest of us spent the evening in one of the small village inns and discussed the days proceedings.

The Sunday is much the same format, except that at 1.00pm they have the prize giving and the Kiwi contingent got the prize for furthest travelled, which meant we had to get up on the stage and wave to the crowd. A chap from Indonesia got the prize for furthest travelled car.

After the prize giving it's time to view what you missed earlier on, followed by a visit to the private museum of the man behind this show (Mr Grundmann) and what a collection



that is! Mr Grundmann gave us a personal tour which had the added advantage of hearing a story about every vehicle on display... and you could see the pride he took in telling those stories. Lots of Porsches and Volkswagens, including many "first editions", and coachbuilts such as Rometsch and Dannhauser-Stauss, as well as the odd oddity, such as a real life-size T1 splittie made entirely out of wood that he got out of east Germany when the wall came down. Yes it is fully operational, and was registered etc in East Germany! He has his own restoration shop and rebuilds cars to as new standards. He also has a huge collection of rare VW memorabilia. Well worth a visit.

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On Monday we paid a visit to the VW Commercial factory in Hannover...this is where they make the current T5 VW Kombi, but also, as it turns out, the body for the Porsche Panamera. We were taken on a tour by a jovial Scotsman who has worked for Volkswagen for 30 odd years. The tour was in a T4 van with a roof chop, so everybody sat up high and had a good view. Stops were frequent and you were able to get off and get up close to some of the assembly lines. Amazing mechanisation... robots everywhere, a robot even installs the complete dashboard into the T5 Kombi, and does up the bolts etc that holds it in there! The Porsche Panamera body panels are stamped here, then the body is assembled and painted before being shipped to a Porsche plant for final assembly. Amazing. The tour lasted over 2 hours. There is also a great shop and showroom to view here.



On Tuesday we visited the VW engine plant in Salzgitter, about an hour away from Hannover. This factory was built in the late sixties to assemble VW's first front engined, front wheel drive car, the VW K70. The guide mentioned that by 1970 VW was panicking because of the world move to front engine/front wheel drive and any idea at VW was a good one, as long as it didn't involve having a air cooled rear engine! The tide was turning as they say. Anyway, the K70 was never a huge success and when production stopped they converted the plant into an engine assembly plant to serve other VW assembly plants. They make everything from a 3 cylinder Polo engine to a 16 cylinder Bugatti Veyron engine here... needless to say more of the Polo variety! There was no Bugatti production going on while we were there but they had an engine on display...what a beast that is. The guide reeled off a few names of people that owned a Bugatti Veyron, including Mr Bean! He said he would put us on the waiting list but we would needed to pay a \$300,000 deposit first! Interesting tour that finished with lunch in the factory cafeteria ... we had VW curry wurst, which is quite famous in Germany and also tastes real good.

On Wednesday we went to Autostadt in Wolfsburg. Autostadt is like an automotive theme park and is adjacent to the VW factory. Parked out front were a couple of the soon to be produced "XL1" gull-winged diesel electric hybrid cars... these cars do 160km/h and return 120km's on one (yes, 1!) litre of diesel! Just to prove to us that these were real cars, a VW employee got in and drove off! We then got on a boat that took us along the canal to the VW factory for our tour of the factory. The factory is highly mechanised of course, with robots everywhere, in fact in some areas there was nothing but robots... the vehicles produced here were the Mk 7 Golf and the Tiguan SUV. Autostadt is laid out like a park, with buildings dotted around lakes etc. There is a separate building for each of the VW owned marques, a history building, the VW new car delivery centre complete with its two glass circular 60 metre high delivery towers etc etc. These delivery towers hold 400 cars each and are fully computer controlled... cars arrive automatically direct from the factory by underground tunnel and are parked by a computer controlled robot arm, where-ever there is a space in one of the towers. Then, when Herr Schmidt turns up at 2.30pm on Wednesday to pick up his new Golf GTI the computer knows exactly where his car is stored and goes and retrieves it via the robot arm... real clever! They even have a "dummy" car setup for sightsee-ers like ourselves who want to experience the ride...marvellous it was too!

On Thursday we visited the VW Museum which has a great collection of all the air-cooled models ever made by VW, including many prototypes of the ones that didn't quite make it to production. In addition there are examples of models from their plants in Brazil and Mexico, including the last Beetle made. Worth a visit! Outside in the courtyard the organisers had setup a couple of trailers selling beer and sausages...what else! A few good hours were spent here talking to like minded people from all over the world!



On Friday it was back to Autostadt again to look at all the things we didn't see the first time round. This time, VW had Electric Golfs parked out front and accepted bookings for test drives. Luckily for me there was still a booking available later that afternoon so I was able to test drive this remarkable vehicle. Fully electric, the car was totally silent, had instant full torque acceleration and felt completely like a normal car. The car does 160km on a charge and it will be on sale in 2014. Great experience! Also looked at the Lamborghini building, which has an amazing act of a real yellow Lambo Murcielargo disappearing before your eyes at full acceleration... and the car does disappear! It's all done with smoke and mirrors and flashing coloured lights and awesome sound effects, but what a performance! The Bugatti building housed a Veyron with a all-chrome finish! It's easy to spend two days at the Autostadt, there is so much to see and do!

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Saturday and Sunday was the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebrations for the city of Wolfsburg and the VW factory. The local VW club had organised a large VW event for the weekend and this attracted a very large number of VW enthusiasts and their cars...probably close to 1000 cars. There was a huge festivities tent setup ( which served not only beer but also yummy cake and coffee!) as well as a swap meet area and activities down on the lake... with schwimmwagens offering rides, so naturally we had to have another go! At the same time, the city itself had turned its main street ( called Porsche strasse of course!) into a huge pedestrian zone lined with all sorts of stalls as well as large entertainment stages with various acts performing throughout the day. For Sunday morning the VW club had organised a drive thru the city to the factory and were hoping to break a record for the largest number of of aircooled VW's in a run but I'm not sure if they managed to break it or not... impressive drive-by though.



So that was our VW experience in Germany... I'd do it again tomorrow! (well, maybe in four years time when the next hessisch show is on again!)... better start saving now!

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### Bitten by the Beetle Bug

Philip Coyle's definitely got the Beetle bug; he drove nothing but classic Beetles for 20 years and he now has three, though he finally succumbed to a modern car too: a Ford Mondeo wagon, "for carrying parts".

Until that arrived, this 1956 NZ-built Beetle was his daily driver and he's had it 13 years. Why Beetles?

"There's a humorous side to them, and the history is interesting as well," says Coyle. He'd have to say that - he's an Auckland high school relief teacher.

What impresses me about this car is it's completely original, right down to the dealer sticker on the dash - TB Baty Ltd, Greymouth - though the 1.2-litre rear-mounted motor had been reconditioned when he got it. "It could do with a paint job and a freshen up," he says.

But the appeal is that every bit of this car is the same as when it was assembled in Otahuhu 57 years ago; the roof lining's showing its age, but the seats are pristine apart from their glossy patina, and the array of fridge magnets adorning the aqua-blue dash just speaks of the life it's lived. Coyle's driven it as far afield as Dunedin and Cape Reinga.

All Coyle's Beetles are of the same era, though it's the German Standard in Jupiter grey with the cable brakes and crash gearbox that's being restored.

He does the grunt work - he'll remove an engine - but he says experts do the tricky stuff.

Why three cars? "Two means one's a spares car, but three's a collection - I have the minimum for a collection," he jokes.

That's a German-sourced roof rack atop the car - the front "boot" is too full of fuel tank, spare tyre and jack to take luggage, and there's not much space behind the rear seat for more than two small suitcases, the 1950 cardboard type, of course. And out back an original luggage rack folds flat, to carry anything you don't mind stinking of exhaust fumes.

There's not much space inside with us both tucked aboard (Coyle's 1.9-metres tall) but the motor fires gamely and soon we're puttering about in it, the engine purring away behind us, engagingly dominating the background along with a slight hum from the wind through the roof rack as Coyle gives me a few tips to mastering Beetle driving.

"You have to keep your foot down round corners or the handling gets funny." Apparently they have a tendency to go straight on. I like the fact you have to drive these, while a modern car does pretty much everything for you.

"I like the fact you have to drive these, while a modern car does pretty much everything for you, though you can't be in too much of a hurry. Mind you, if I go to Wellington in it, it only takes half an hour longer than in my modern car."

I've been tallying the comfort and convenience features - two coat hooks, an ash tray, and accessory sunshields of smoked plastic that swivel down like a pair of cheap sunglasses, plus a single trafficator that flicks up on the left-hand side: indicating right requires an arm stuck out the window.

The four-speed gearbox is a cinch to navigate, and the engine feels game despite its modest 27kW. But it's got 710kg plus passengers to shift, so actual acceleration is relaxed and by golly, he's not joking, you really do have to press the accelerator pedal to get it round corners, the steering gets super-heavy if you don't.

"I think you're the only woman to drive this and smile," says Coyle, who doesn't know my earliest car memories are from the back seat of a Beetle when I was 4 or 5. Claimed top speed is 109km/h - and Coyle says it'll sit happily at 85 or 90km/h; I'll take his word.

The colour is somehow both retro and modern. Coyle says while Germany controlled most of VW's presence in New Zealand - right down to dealer layout - the colours were chosen by Kiwis. "The production manager and his secretary chose what was fashionable at the time and it didn't relate at all to the German colours."

You can see why original Beetle owners become such fanatics - the car's cute, surprisingly practical and oozes character. But what do the teens he teaches think of it? "Some of them think it's funny - and some that it's a Morris Minor. What's wrong with kids these days!"



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
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
